Visitors to Art Basel Miami (December 6 to 9) will be amazed by the tidal wave of design that has swept the city. The Design District's Design Miami, one of the fair's many offshoots, is dedicated to the booming new field of Design Art as well as historically significant work. There is also a host of new design stores. Here's what's happening:

■ SHOP

In the burgeoning Wynwood Art District is the first United States outpost of **Moooli**, Marcel Wanders's Netherlands-based design collective, where you'll find pieces like the *Jester* sofa, below (3438 N. Miami Ave.; 305/573-4445, Moooli.com). Also launching on U.S. soil for the first time is **Driade**, the Italian furniture company that sells everything from Ron Arad's *MT3* rocking chair to Naoto Fukasawa's colorful plastic dinnerware (4141 NE 2nd Ave.; 305/572-2900, DriadeMiami.com).

Finally, the city's preeminent design outpost, **Luminaire**, has opened **Luminaire Lab** in the Design District, where it features cutting-edge work by the likes of Jaime Hayon and Tord Boontje (3901 NE 2nd Ave.; 305/576-5788, Luminaire.com).

Can't make it to Art Basel? Then get your hands on a limited-edition **beach towel** from Target.com's Red Hot Shop. Designed specifically for the event by art world luminaries such as Cindy Sherman and Jeff Koons (his towel is below), these are going

to be snapped up by every collector who has a beach house, so get 'em while you can (\$50; Target.com).

■ EAT

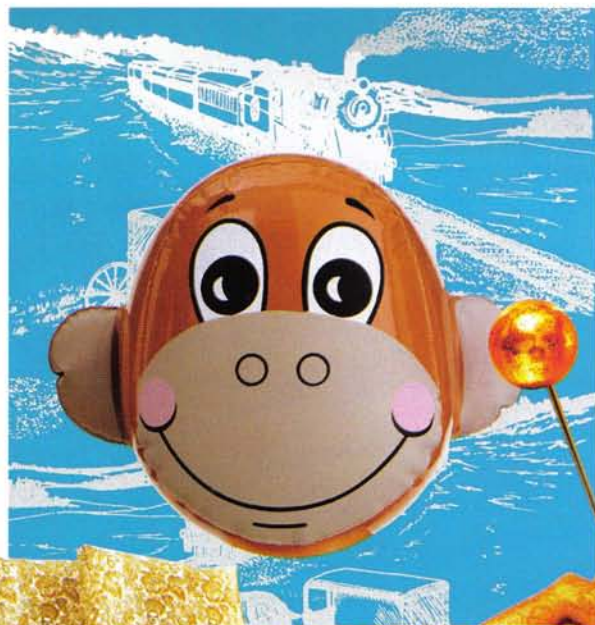
While in town, try **La Marea**. Previously with L.A.'s Il Sole Italian Restaurant, executive chef Pietro Rota is serving up innovative dishes at the Mediterranean-inspired restaurant located in the historic **Tides Hotel**—duck confit with warm lentils and foie gras essence (\$28), for one. The space (right), which makes bold use of the humble tortoise shell, has been made over by designer Kelly Wearstler (1220 Ocean Dr., Miami Beach; 305/604-5070, TidesSouthBeach.com).

■ STAY

You can stay at the **Anglers Boutique Resort**. Nestled on lower Washington Avenue in South Beach, the historic property, built in the 1930s and frequented by Ernest Hemingway, has



been restored by preservationist architect Allan Shulman. Wallace Tutt (of Versace mansion fame) has designed the interiors, though in a decidedly more subdued, sand-inspired palette of neutrals. Rooms are either duplex suites, with the main living area and upstairs bedroom connected by a steel spiral staircase, or one-level studio suites. Daily rates range from \$290 to \$1,200 (660 Washington Ave.; 305/534-9600, TheAnglersResort.com).
